Work on the organisation of the 8th WIETE Annual Conference on Engineering and Technology Education is in full swing. The Conference will be held between 20 and 24 February 2017 at Cinnamon Residence in Bangkok, Thailand, under the theme Bringing Engineering and Technology Educators Together. Considering the still uncertain global economy and poorly financed public education institutions, the response to the call for papers has been more than encouraging. Consequently, an editorial decision was made to publish Conference paper contributions in two consecutive issues of the World Transactions on Engineering and Technology Education (WTE&TE) that is in Vol.14, No.4 and Vol.15, No.1.

Therefore, this issue of the WTE&TE, Vol.14, No.4, consists of the first batch of papers submitted to the Conference. It includes 22 articles that have come from countries such as the People's Republic of China (9), Poland (3), Slovenia (2), the United Arab Emirates (2), and one article from each of Australia, India, Indonesia, Slovakia, Taiwan and Thailand. Editorial work has commenced on the second batch of Conference papers, with the objective of releasing them to the public soon after the Conference. In this way, the Conference organisers have created an opportunity for those colleagues who may still wish to attend the Conference and present their research papers, but who were unable to submit their papers earlier.
